GAME STORY

January 1, 2026

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — A dominant defensive performance helped the Oregon Ducks move on in the semifinal round of the College Football Playoffs with a 23-0 victory over No. 4 Texas Tech in the 92nd Capital One Orange Bowl at Hard Rock Stadium on Thursday afternoon.

The No. 5 Ducks (13-1) advanced to the CFP Semifinals against the winner of Thursday's Indiana and Alabama in the Chik-fil-A Bowl in Atlanta on Jan. 9.

Texas Tech ends 12-2 with a Big 12 championship.

"Unbelievable game. A lot of fun. We've talked to our guys about being battle tested all year and having to win in different ways," Oregon coach Dan Lanning said.

"That game went back and forth in a lot of ways, [we] struggled at times to go score points, and our defense did an unbelievable job getting the ball back. And then our offense showed up when it mattered most at the end of the game. I think we out-physicaled our opponent at the end. ...

"Proud of our players, the resiliency they showed, their ability to stay calm and poised and collected under pressure. It's not easy in big moments. But these guys have shown and proven time after time, these two guys up here,

that team in that locker room have shown time and time again that they're ready for big moments."

The defense on both sides was the story of this game.

Oregon held the Red Raiders to 215 yards of offense and forced four turnovers.

Brandon Finney Jr., a freshman defensive back, was named Orange Bowl defensive MVP after intercepting a pair of passes in the win.

Oregon's defensive gem is the first shutout in the history of the College Football Playoffs.

"I feel like our defense is the best at preparing in the nation," Finney said, "so what Coach Tosh Lupoi and what Coach Lanning do just throughout the week, just preparing us as players, getting ready for the game plan, just helps us as players to just be ready and execute. That's our job."

The Ducks got a 50-yard field goal from Atticus Sappington on their opening drive after Oregon forced Texas Tech into a 3-and-out to start things off.

Yet despite a dominant defensive performance — and some pretty good numbers by Offensive MVP Dante Moore — Oregon only led 6-0 at halftime.

That gave Texas Tech hope for a big second half.

It just did not come.

"It's no fun being in that locker room right now," Texas Tech coach Joey McGuire said. "I've said it all year long: Been doing this for 31 years. I've never been a part of a closer group of men and never been so proud.

"One thing that I told them, and I truly believe it, like when you do something that nobody has ever done, nobody has ever done what these guys did wearing this uniform, ever, so the standard is set. That's where you start building something really special. I can't thank them enough. This is going to hurt for a long time. I know these guys are hurting right now. But can't be more proud of my football team."

It would not take long for Oregon to give itself some needed breathing room.

Oregon gave Texas Tech the ball back at the 32 by coming up short on a scramble by Moore on a fourth-and-2.

On third down, linebacker Matayo Uiagelelei stripped Tech quarterback Behren Morton of the ball and rumbled all the way down to the 6.

Freshman running back Jordon Davison went around right tackle on the very next play, scoring the first of his two touchdowns – the only touchdowns of the game – for a 13-0 lead with 11:20 remaining in the third.

"It was a crazy turn of events," said Davison, who put an exclamation mark on the win by scoring from the 1 with 16 seconds remaining.

"We always practice sudden change, so we were prepared. And excited."

The opening half of the game was dominated by the excellent defenses of both teams.

Oregon led 6-0 at halftime off a pair of field goals after holding Texas Tech to 88 yards of total offense – 50 of which came off a nice run from J'Koby Williams early in the second.

The Ducks forced two turnovers in the first half, the second of which lead to a 39-yard field goal from Sappington for the final points before intermission.

Sappington was 3-for-4 on field goals, accounting for 11 (with two PATs) of Oregon's 23 points.

Moore did not lead the Ducks to the end zone in the first half, but he put up some fantastic numbers throwing for 192 yards on 22-of-27 passing.

He ended up completing 26 of 33 for 234 yards with an interception.

"Like Coach Lanning always says, 'you never want to look too far ahead.' You want to be where your feet are at, being in the present moment," Moore said.

Kennedy opened the 1pm game between 5-Alabama and 8-Oklahoma by participating in the coin toss. Alabama's Lee Roy Jordan won the toss by calling "tails". Bear Bryant's Alabama squad blanked Bud Wilkerson's Oklahoma Sooners, 17-0.

THE LIGHT OF DAY: Prior to today, the last daytime OB Starts were in 2023 & 2015 (both 4pm) – they marked the first daytime kickoffs in 52 years. **FYI:** The First Night game in Orange Bowl History was January 1, 1964 – Nebraska 13 Auburn 7. The NBC telecast was also the first New Year's Day bowl game played at night. A year later on January 1, 1965 Orange Bowl MVP Joe Namath's Alabama Crimson Tide lost to the

Texas Long Horns, 21-17 – in the first national college telecast (NBC) in Prime Time.

ON TO THE NEXT ROUND: With today's victory Oregon will face the winner of tonight's 9-Alabama vs 1- Indiana 4pm et (ESPN), CFP Quarterfinal at The Rose Bowl Presented by Prudential.

The Rose Bowl winner faces Oregon, January 9, in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (7:30 pm et, ESPN).

- Texas Tech is the 5th straight team to be held scoreless in the First Quarter (3-0)...three of those lost the game.
- Today: Texas Tech – No points in first half. The last Orange Bowl team held scoreless in the first half –
- Florida State vs Oklahoma (3-0) on January 3, 2001.

- Oklahoma went on to capture the National Championship, 13-2.
 - The Red Raiders were also held scoreless in the 3rd quarter – last Florida State (2001).
- Today's result is the 9th Shutout in Orange Bowl history and the first since Miami captured a national title by blanking Nebraska, 22-0.

JOEY MCGUIRE: Well, I want to start off by thanking Red Raider Nation for showing up today, man. It was really special. It's been an incredible ride this year, but it was really special to have so many Texas Tech fans. I'm sorry that we let you down. But I hope you've enjoyed every second of this year. Man, this is such a special team and I'm so proud of them. But thank you for that.

Hats off to Dan Lanning and hats off to the Oregon Ducks. Just an incredible football team. They played at a really high level today. I'm going to be rooting for them.

I told Dan after the game, I hope he wins the whole damn thing. They're a good football team.

I also thought, and a lot of people don't say it and I don't know if I've ever said it in a press conference, but I thought the officiating was as good as I've been a part of in college football. Hats off to the ACC crew today. They did a good job.

It's no fun being in that locker room right now. I've said it all year long. Been doing this for 31 years. I've never been a part of a closer group of men and never been so proud.

One thing that I told them, and I truly believe it, like when you do something that nobody has ever done, nobody has ever done what these guys did wearing this uniform, ever, so then the standard is set. That's where you start building something really special.



So I can't thank them enough. This is going to hurt for a long time. I know these guys are hurting right now. But can't be more proud of my football team.

Q. For Behren, start of the fourth quarter, obviously a lot of things had gone wrong offensively up to that point, but you do get the opportunity there in the red zone. Can you just describe what you guys were talking about and thinking kind of at the doorstep of that opportunity and then what happened on the interception?

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, we got a time-out so we had a play that we wanted to run. I didn't have good eyes. They came out in something that I thought they were in differently. I thought they were in man, and I threw the corner route, corner fell off of it, made a great play. I thought we saw a really good defense today, but I thought offensively it's just not the standard of football that Texas Tech plays.

But like Coach said, a lot to be proud of this year. But today was tough.

Q. Behren, can you take us through your emotions right now? Obviously this is the accumulation of a big career for you.

BEHREN MORTON: It's tough. I love this university, everything that it stands for, and I've been a Red Raider since I was a little kid.

To get to do this this year has been awesome. A great group of guys. Man, it's just been so fun just to put Texas Tech back on the map. Lubbock deserves every bit of everything that happened this year. We can hang our hat on something. Obviously not the outcome that we wanted, but really proud of this team and the way that we fought through adversity this year. I'm proud to be a Red Raider.

Q. Behren, in terms of the offensive struggle today, would you say it had more to do with rust from the layoff with scheme with their defense, with the talent disparities? What could you put your finger on?



BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, I think that we had a great game plan. The whole month really we had a great game plan. We just didn't execute base plays. We didn't run our day one stuff that we'd run good.

I didn't do a good job of settling down and really focusing on the next play. But there was a lot of things that we could have done differently. Can't give them the ball. We've got to keep the ball on our side when we're on offense.

But just a lot of bad football on offense.

Q. Joey, the same question to you: What did you feel like it was that kept you all from being the kind of offense you all have been all year?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, you can't turn the ball over. It's a really good defense. It's one of the top defenses in the country. We knew that coming in. I want to give them all the credit. They did a great job defending us. I thought they did a good job of keeping the ball in front of them, not giving up a lot of big plays. We've been a big play offense, explosive offense. They kept the ball in front of them.

But you can't turn the ball over four times. I think that led to 13 points. Then the other part of that was we were not good on 2nd down. I didn't think we were horrible on 1st down, but on 2nd down we were not efficient at all, so it put us in some really tough 3rd downs, and man, they played really well on defense.

Q. For Jacob, I know you guys are hurting right now, but can you talk about what it's meant to you to be with this group and be a Texas Tech Red Raider?

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: It means everything to me. I know that this changed my life. It's changed my family's life. It's not just me; it's everybody in that locker room. This double T has touched everybody in a way that -- this year was so special for us.

Today didn't go the way we wanted it to, but I'll always be able to look back on this year and be proud of the people that were around me. I kind of told them throughout, just a couple minutes ago, that they've got me for the rest of their life. I'm not going anywhere. I'm here for them always. They've got me forever.

The way this place and this university and this program has changed my life, I'm hoping to be able to do that for every single one of them.

Q. For Coach McGuire, I know you guys are hurting, but first playoff, first 12-win season, great recruiting

class coming in. The future is bright for Red Raider football.

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah. People have asked me a lot, have you been able to reflect on this year and everything, and I never do that until it's all said and done. The next few days I'll definitely reflect.

I do think that we've set a standard that we're going to try to live up to. We're losing some really great football players, but you've always got to do something special, do something that the guys -- like Oregon is about to try to go to, and Miami. There's got to be a first, and this was the first group that was able to do that. No Red Raider team before us were able to do what we've accomplished this year.

But today will hurt for a long time, but we're going to learn from it. We're going to keep getting better.

Q. Joey or Behren, there's going to be a lot of conversation around the layoff and teams now being 0-6 after the bye. Defense didn't seem to skip a beat, but was there anything you sensed in the offensive struggles that caught up to you or maybe in the prep that 20 minutes off the field you would have liked to have done differently?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Man, the tough thing is if we use the layoff, then we're going to use an excuse. And we believe in this program you don't make excuses and you don't let anybody make them for you.

We've got to do better. If this is going to be what the College Football Playoffs is, then we've got to find a way to be better to win that game.

But I think more than anything, it was a mixture of playing a really good Oregon defense and us not executing at a high level. I think whenever you're in these games and you're playing teams that's every bit as good and every bit as talented as you are and vice versa, then you've got to execute at a high level, and I think that was the biggest thing.

Now, I'll piggyback off of Dan and we'll see what everybody else says. We're in a world that makes no sense. But that's where we're at, and you've got to find a way to be better to win this game.

Q. Joey, through the course of the season, you guys proved you were the best team in the Big 12 by a pretty significant margin. Today, from your perspective, was it a bad day, or did they present something from a size-speed quotient that maybe the Big 12 hadn't

 . . . when all is said, we're done.®

prepared you for?

JOEY MCGUIRE: No, I mean, I know stats are a little bit different, but they rushed for -- they were rushing for over 200 yards against Big Ten teams and they rushed for 64 yards today. I know some of that was in sacks and snaps and stuff like that, but we still did that.

I do think, and Behren will probably say the same thing, I think defensively that was probably the best defense we've faced this year. I do think they did a really good job schematically. Their defensive coordinator, defensive staff did a really good job of giving us some issues.

But I go back, and whenever you turn the ball over -- let's say we turned the ball over four times, if you look at the 4th down conversion, there was really one that was like a competitive gain that we didn't get, so that's a fifth turnover. The score was 23-0. We were desperate, so they get that last touchdown that we didn't hold them out.

If you look -- and they scored, what did we say, 13 off of turnovers? We didn't play good enough. It really wasn't the patch on anybody's arm. That's a really good football team, though. If the quarterback decides to go in the draft, he's probably going to be the first or second guy taken.

It just comes down to execution, and we didn't execute at a high level.

Q. David Bailey showed out today. What did he show NFL scouts today?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Well, I think he's showed all year long, I'm sitting there and I'm an NFL team, if I'm not taking a quarterback or a left tackle, if I'm a team that's going to take a defensive player, I don't know what defensive player out there you would take over David Bailey. I really don't.

I've been around some special guys. I got to coach a really special one as a position coach, and then we had Tyree Wilson. Honestly, some of the stuff that he does I've never seen a guy do at that level. If I'm an NFL team and I want to take a defensive player, I'm taking him first overall.

Q. If I told you this morning that their quarterback, who you just said is going to be one of the first picks in the draft, didn't have a touchdown pass, would you take that from your defense?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, when we went in at halftime it was 6-0. We missed a field goal -- we've got one of the best kickers in the country, and he's made some long critical field goals this year, and we just pushed it to the left.

But if you would have woke up this morning and told me it was going to be 6-0 at halftime, then I would have taken that, too. I knew this was going to be a dogfight. We really did. If you look statistically at the two defenses, you've got two of the best defenses in the country going at each other.

Yeah, I would have taken the 6-0 at halftime.

Q. Following up on that, considering it was 6-0 at halftime, for either Joey or Behren, when you guys went in to regroup and plan out the second half, was there anything you wanted to go to to try to get yourself going? Considering it was only a one-score game at that time, were you still looking to hit with a big play?

BEHREN MORTON: I think we were just trying to find a good play that we could get in rhythm. I felt on 1st down we were trying to find our rhythm, and we didn't find our rhythm for a while. Coming out in the second half, we just talked about execution. We've got to execute. We didn't execute in the first or second half, and that gets you beat every time.

It just really comes down to executing the base plays, and we did not do that.

Q. Jacob, for you guys on the defense, in terms of how you wanted to approach Oregon and perform against them, did this meet your expectations in terms of how you wanted to slow this team down, this kind of offense? How did you view them from your perspective?

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: Yeah, I think we did a good job of matching up and kind of knowing exactly what they wanted to do. A lot of the errors were on our part, self-inflicted, just us not communicating as much as we wanted to and being in the right position.

But man, I was super proud of our guys flying around, hitting and going at the ball. It was just kind of how it goes sometimes. I know we had a few drives start on our side of the 50, and it's hard to play defense like that.

But I'm really proud of our guys for doing what we did. A big plan for us was -- they're really explosive. They've got guys who can go all over the field. If we just get the ball down, we'll live with a 20- or 30-yard gain, if we can just get the ball down and play the next play. And you kind of saw that on a lot of the long drives. Q: Can you describe the mood in the Texas Tech locker room postgame?

DAVID BAILEY: It was obviously not great. We expected a different outcome. But it is what it is. ... We knew what we were able to accomplish. The Big 12 championship really wasn't the goal. We knew we could go further. We had a lot of talent on this team. We had a lot of pieces on this team. So, we expected a different outcome.

Q: Do you think this program will be in contention at this level for years to come?

DAVID BAILEY: Yeah, I think so for sure. As long as Coach McGuire is here and he has the same staff behind him, I think they're going to do even greater things than we did this year.

Q: What was the feeling at halftime after holding Oregon to just 6 points in the first half?

DAVID BAILEY: We were feeling good. We were feeling optimistic. I know Coach McGuire was emphasizing how grateful we are to be in this position. Obviously we're playing a great offense, so to hold them to six points in the first

half, we were feeling pretty good about ourselves. We just had to take the next steps to cut that lead down.

PREGAME PRESS CONFERENCE

THE MODERATOR: A very pleasant good morning to everyone. Happy New Year, or happy New Year's Eve, and welcome to the head coaches' press conference for the 2026 College Football Playoff quarterfinal at the CapitalOne Orange Bowl. I'm Don Jackson, and it's my privilege to serve as your moderator for today's coaches' press conference.

We will first welcome Texas Tech head coach Joey McGuire to say a few opening remarks and then we will hear from Oregon head coach Dan Lanning. Coach McGuire?

JOEY McGUIRE: Thank you. Man, we're really excited and honored to be here. I'm kind of one of those guys that can fan boy really easy over great coaches, and I'm a huge fan of Dan's. I watch a lot of his stuff that he puts out on social media or anytime there's a press conference. I don't have a lot of hobbies, but that's one. I pay attention to a lot of coaches around the nation, especially guys that are doing it right.

We're really honored to play against such a great team like Oregon. I think it's going to be

the best game, without a doubt, in these quarterfinals. You've got two great teams.

We were talking earlier, it's like looking in the mirror. You've got great defenses. You've got explosive offenses. I think both of our offenses probably produced the most explosive plays in college football this year.

It's going to be a lot of fun tomorrow. We're excited to be here, and we've got a big day today. It's our Fast Friday on a Wednesday, and then we'll be ready to go tomorrow.

Just thank you for letting us be a part of this. I promise you we'll be ready to go.

DAN LANNING: Certainly honored to be here. First want to thank the Orange Bowl. The hospitality has been first notch. Really honored to get the opportunity to share a stage with Coach McGuire. Both of us started off as high school coaches. I'm sure he's very similar to me in the sense that we pinch ourselves every day to get to do what we do and who we do it with.

Obviously Texas Tech has an unbelievable team. And he's right, when you watch it,



something we've talked about since we arrived here is our ability to create explosive plays and eliminate explosive plays. When you look at both these teams, they're two of the best in the nation at doing that, creating explosive plays, and certainly two of the best in the nation at eliminating that.

This will be an exciting game, certainly an exciting opportunity for us. A lot of these last few weeks for us has been about creating that rhythm that you have as a team, and you heard Coach just say it's Fast Friday. I had somebody text me this morning about it being Wednesday; I said, what are you talking about? It's Friday.

Your clock is off a little bit as a coach, but our players have prepped really, really hard, and there's a ton of respect for Texas Tech and what they've been able to create this year. The team, the way they play, I think that's a true indication of the way Coach McGuire coaches.

But our guys are really excited about this opportunity to share a field, and it's an awesome venue to get to be a part of.

THE MODERATOR: Now we'll open it up for questions for both coaches.

Q. Coaches, what is the best advice you've received to bringing your team and preparing them to be at a new venue in this type of atmosphere?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, ultimately, both of us get the opportunity to travel on the road, and I think we've really been prepared for moments like that. We've traveled across the country several times this year, something that's prepared you.

The football field is the same length, same width. You get an opportunity to go out there

and compete with your teammates, and I think we both are hoping for a great crowd from both sides, so there's not a lot that's different. Even though there's distractions that exist as you go out to games like this, there's some pomp and circumstance, there's some fanfare, ultimately the game is the same and the guys got to go out there and play the game.

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, I would totally agree. The people that I've talked to say, man, just stay -- and Dan talked about it, stay in rhythm.

Again, today, they probably know it's Wednesday, but it's Fast Friday for us. Don't change anything. You're here for a reason, and what you've done all year long has worked, so stick with that.

We were lucky enough, and I know they were, too, we were able to go over to Hard Rock. We didn't go on the field, but just seeing the venue, our guys are really honored and excited to play in that stadium.

But I think the biggest thing is just keep doing what we do.

Q. For Dan Lanning, how would you describe the process you've had with your outgoing staff? Obviously they've got a lot of responsibilities with their next programs, and also just from the head coach's standpoint, are there positives to having two guys off your staff that got head coaching jobs this year?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, I talk about it a lot. I set goals personally for myself, and my number one goal is to help people reach their dreams and goals. And when you see a guy like Tosh Lupoi that I've got to work with for a long time and Will Stein, who I've gotten to work with the last



three years, work their tails off to earn opportunities, you're really excited.

I tell every recruit that walks in our office, look, I can't promise you who will be here as your coaches because I want to help create their dreams, as well, but I can promise you I'll be here as your head coach. That's a piece that won't change.

I'll say both those guys have had unbelievable focus on our team. I think they both recognize they'd never had the opportunities they have if it wasn't for the players at Oregon and the place of Oregon, and I think they feel a term of endearment. They feel like they owe it to our players to give their absolute best on the way out.

I remember -- this is kind of sentimental for me. Leaving Georgia, I went through kind of the same process. The hotel we're staying in this week, I remember hiring my strength coach, Wilson Love, in that hotel. I remember reaching out to coaches on staff and hiring them during this same process in the Orange Bowl when I was at Georgia, so it's kind of a full-circle moment to see them going through the same things.

But I'm very appreciative to the detail that they've put in, the work they've put in, and it's led to some long nights and not a lot of sleep, but I always tell our coaching staff, you can sleep when you die.

These guys have worked really hard. They've earned it. I'm excited about their opportunities, and I'm excited about the opportunity to grow through our teams. When there's transition, there's opportunities for new ideas. There's opportunities for us to continue to grow.

Q. For Joey, on a similar note, your former offensive coordinator, Zach Kittley, is the head coach at FAU. I'm wondering if at any point during this buys week you've gotten a chance to visit with him and catch up and hear how the season has gone?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, I talked to him. Actually he's going to be at practice this morning because we're practicing at FAU. We changed our venue, and it was great to see a bunch of guys that were on staff with us yesterday. We had our walk-through, our Thursday walk-through yesterday, and there was a bunch of guys.

His head strength coach was our No. 2. His chief of staff was one of our assistant DFOs. So it was great to see those guys.

He did, man -- he was a couple plays away from being in a bowl game, and I know he's itching to recruit right now and bring some guys in, and he had a really good signing class.

Kitts, man, he's a stud. I'm really happy and excited for him that he had that opportunity.

Q. Do you think he gets to share in some of this success and understand he's been part of the build to this game?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, without a doubt. He's a Red Raider. He was there on staff as a student, and then he was kind of Kliff's right-hand man growing up. His dad is probably the most decorated track coach in the country right now, so he's still got family out there. He was in Lubbock for Christmas.

I know he's really excited. I know he's excited to see the guys. I told the guys he was coming to practice, he and Behren Morton, our



quarterback, are really, really close, so I know he's excited to see him today.

Q. Dan, to go back to the coaching changes and all that, on the outside we can sit here and look and say there's got to be a better way, and from where you sit, the portal is going to open, recruiting never stops. There probably is no better way. But would you rather see a process that might be a bit more streamlined and not allow at the biggest time of the year, the biggest games of the year for things to sort of seem so kind of topsy-turvy like they are at so many places right now?

DAN LANNING: Well, I think there's clearly a better way, and I think it really starts with the season moving up and the playoffs not having -- how many days, Coach, is it for you between us and your last game?

JOEY MCGUIRE: We played December 6, and I'm 100 percent with him about moving the --

DAN LANNING: Yeah, ultimately in my mind the vision for this should be every playoff game should be played every single weekend until you finish the season. Ideally the season, even if it means we start week zero, or you eliminate a bye, the season ends January 1st. This should be the last game. This should be the championship game. Then the portal opens, and then coaches that have to move on to their next opportunities get the opportunity to move to their next opportunities.

Certainly there's some conversation about when high school signing days should be. I think that could go either way because most of us now try to get guys in as mid-year players, and you want them to be able to join your program at semester, which is a challenge.

But I think the first really clear indicator of a place that we can make this better is to wrap the season up. Our National Championship game this year is January 19th, and that's really hard to envision as a coach that's going out and trying to join a new program and start a staff. It's hard for players to understand what continuity looks like and where are they going to be at and to manage that with visits, the portal, everything else that exists.

I think the clear indicator and the clear way to do that is to bump the season up and make sure these playoff games happen a lot faster.

I've got a ton of respect for the NFL, but we're a prep league for the NFL. We do a lot of favors for the NFL. We're the minor league in a lot of ways. But there's no money paid from the NFL to take care of college football.

In that sense, we've given up some of our days to the NFL. We said, you guys get to have this day, you get to have this day, you get to have this day. Saturdays should be sacred for college football, and every Saturday through the month of December should belong to college football in my opinion.

Q. Dan, the nature of retention in recruiting has gotten a lot more transactional. In some ways that comes across as being a little derogatory, but it's sort of the nature of the beast. This is still college football; how do you balance the relationship piece, more of what you would consider the traditional recruiting, dealing with young men, while also understanding that there is a transactional piece to this?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Well, I'm lucky; I think I have the best general manager in the country in James Blanchard and his staff, and we have a personnel staff. I'm never in any meeting



whenever it comes to money. I try the best I can to keep the coach/player relationship as traditional as it has been whenever I was coached by Harris Brownlee and Tom McCohen and the relationships I had with those guys. I'm also a very emotional person, so it's better for me to not be in these meetings. James keeps it very black and white, and as you said, it is very transactional.

But I also think there's a lot of things that are still going on at Oregon and Texas Tech that are incredible for young people, that we're creating better men. I have 33 college graduates that will take the field tomorrow. We hold every GPA record in the 100-year history at Texas Tech, but we just broke the record, and my team has a 3.23 GPA, so all the people saying that they came for money and we paid this and this and this, man, turn on the tape and see how hard we play, and then, guess what, my guys went to class and excelled in the classroom.

I think that's still such a huge part of what we're doing, and I think whenever people come into your building and they feel that and they see that, they want to come to places like Oregon and Texas Tech because it is about the money, there's no doubt about that, but it's also about we can help them reach their goals and their dreams and be better people.

DAN LANNING: Yeah, venues like this are a great example of the value that players have for organizations. We don't get to coach if there aren't players. As much as the game has changed, a lot of it still has stayed the same. We're in year four here at Oregon, and we've never lost a starter to the transfer portal. I think retention is the biggest piece. I think that's really important, and that's twofold.

It always starts for me, what can I control, the relationships. I want to make sure we have great strong relationships with our players. A lot of times guys are going to choose to stay for less, but we also want them to be treated fair, and if they have the opportunity to have success, we want to make sure we're able to maximize that opportunity.

That's not just what a school can give a player, it's the recognition a school can create, it's the story that a school can tell. I think Oregon and Texas Tech have both been elite at that.

Then it starts at high school recruiting. It's development. Our team has a lot of freshmen that are contributing this year, a lot of guys that have been able to make an impact, and I always say, if you're good enough, you're old enough.

When you make an impact, I think stepping out into that water of, okay, I'm going to try this again somewhere else, when you know the known. We know it exists at Oregon. You know if you work your tail off, you're going to get an opportunity. I think that can be scary. Even if the dollar or the price tag might be somewhere else, the known of being in a program like Oregon, getting the opportunities that you get, that's something you want to take advantage of. Then that's where you hope the relationship matters.

We've had some really mature kids. These guys had to make really mature decisions that I don't know that I could make when I was their age. I know I'd probably screw it up and I'd probably have a dorm room full of Natural Ice if I was 19 years old, but it's changed.

These guys handle really, really tough decisions and they lean on people, and you hope they get really sound advice. But what warms your heart



is the text message you get from a mom about what you've done for my son, from a high school coach of how you've created confidence in this kid, and you hope all those things pay off and they're able to make mature decisions that are big-boy decisions that a lot of these guys don't get faced with.

Sometimes that means making a sacrifice and maybe not making as much as you might somewhere else or being able to maximize your value where they're at, and I think we have a lot of guys that have been able to maximize their value here.

Q. Joey, you're in the same situation as Dan was last year in terms of being the team that does have the longer layoff, and in last year's playoffs didn't work out for the teams that did have the longer layoffs, so I'm wondering if you've asked questions to some of the coaches that were in a similar situation as you are this year and how you get your team ready to face a team that's already played?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, one thing, we've got an old team. We've got a lot of snaps in college football, and I ask them, man, please make me right because the one thing that we did do, we needed the bye.

Now, everybody that played December 6, seven days later they would have played. We just would have been football banged up. But the guys that I talked to, I talked to Kenny Perry, my special teams coordinator. I talked to Sonny Dykes whenever they played Michigan that year, some of the stuff that they would have done maybe different. Talked to Kenny. He had the bye last year with Arizona State and some of the stuff they did.

What we tried to do was add some time where the players were together more, more events as a team because we weren't in school and we weren't on a normal schedule. So we had some more downtime.

Then the biggest thing what we try to do is we do good-on-good but we added periods, or there would be sudden changes in practice. Howard Sampson saw he was blocking David Bailey or trying to block him from the standpoint of just the speed of the game because you're not seeing that, that we're going to have to see tomorrow and try to deal with. We try to do stuff like that to try to stay in rhythm.

We needed a little bit of rest, though, too, especially our quarterback. I think he feels really good, and hopefully it shows up tomorrow.

Q. You've called Dante Moore "special," but what about him makes him different from other opposing quarterbacks?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Well, no disrespect to any quarterback that we've faced, but he's the best quarterback we've played all year long. He extends plays with his feet. You see that.

But whenever you turn on the tape, he's as accurate as anybody that we've played or really more accurate whenever he throws the deep ball. He's got great skill around him, but he throws a great deep ball.

I just love his story. So you know he's a mature person and he's really grown because there's not a lot of people in this day and age that would sit behind -- especially at the quarterback position, sit behind people. I'm really lucky my quarterback has been here from day one. He was born in Lubbock, and he's got a Texas Tech



degree. There's not a lot of people that do that. They don't want to sit; they want to play right now. He redshirted and grew as a quarterback.

I just think he's dynamic. Whenever you see him, he just continues to make plays. Whenever it's time to make a play with his feet, he makes a play with his feet, makes a play with his arm. He's tough, and just watching what they do offensively schematically, he also has a high football IQ because he can really digest what they do and play at a really high level.

Q. Joey, Behren is one of four quarterbacks in the CFP field that's still with the school he signed with, and he's easily the most experienced of them. When you look at his journey and where he's been to get to this point, do you appreciate the fact that perhaps we're not going to have so many Behren Mortons and guys like him down the line?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, I hope I have another one in Will Hammond. He's dealing with an ACL. But Behren, I just have not been around -- I've done this 31 years - here in a few weeks it'll be 32 because I started in January - and he's the toughest player I've ever been around. There's a lot of things that he's dealt with over his career that a lot of quarterbacks around the nation didn't play, and he played.

He has such a respect in that locker room and he's got such a big voice. I feel like one thing about this team, putting this team together, this is as healthy of a locker room as I've ever been a part of. The care factor in that locker room is so high, and he's been such a -- he's been the force behind it.

I asked him to really step out and cross over to the other side of the ball and bring Lee Hunter into what it means to be a Red Raider. David

Bailey, Romello Height, he was the leader in bringing this team so close together.

I'm going to miss him. It was really cool in the Big 12 Championship, his dad sent me a text and said, hey, look, I want a Big 12 Championship and I want a picture of you two walking out of the stadium together, and it was really cool we got to do that. We made a point, both of us, because we had talked about it in January, in January the year before, of making that happen, and we walked out together, and there's some really cool pictures of us coming out of that game together.

Q. Dan, you've talked about strength in numbers with this team, and at the running back position in particular, you've really been able to have some depth. Why do you think that group has been able to excel when it comes to readiness, both Jordon and Dierre being ready to go early in their careers but also within the flow of a game whenever your number gets called being able to step up and perform?

DAN LANNING: It starts probably with the leadership in that room. Coach Samples done an unbelievable job. But we have a veteran in there with Noah Whittington, and he's worn a lot of hats. He's been injured and came back from injury, but he demands -- it's like having another coach at the position there, and he demands that these guys do it the right way.

Then the young guys being able to throw -- handle whatever we throw on their plate. You give them a bite, and take advantage of short yardage. You give them a play, and they take advantage of it, and you're like, okay, let's give them more.

Those guys have done an unbelievable job of the more that you can give them, the more they can



handle, and they've created something that can be really dynamic for us. Once you start talking about the variety of formations and plays that we can run with multiple personnel groups, the fact you can make sure there's a fresh player in there, and then strength in numbers has really just been a mantra for our team this entire year. If we've got to be a 12 personnel team to win, we'll do it. If we've got to be an 11 personnel team, if we've got to play 21, if it's going to be a two-minute drive or if it's a tight defensive ballgame, we can play in a variety of ways. I think that shows up in moments where you have to lean on your depth and lean on players that have to be ready for their opportunity. We've had a lot of guys that have been ready for their opportunity when their number was called.

Q. Following on an earlier question about the January calendar, in less than 48 hours when the portal opens, for the winner that's going to be particularly difficult logistically and practically. Presuming you win, how will you plan to manage that with the academic calendar and the road that creates at Oregon?

DAN LANNING: More than anything, just being honest. Be honest with your players. The one thing I expect from anybody that enters the portal from our team is communication. The University of Oregon has given you an opportunity. We've coached you really hard. We've built relationships. We expect you to be able to communicate with us on what that looks like. Similar to Coach McGuire, we've talked about you come in here and win this game, you're going to send other people on the road in your organization than normal to help do some of the recruiting for you, and that's why it's important to have a really strong personnel department that can help you with that because if you continue to prepare for games and there's

opportunities to recruit, you want to make sure you're able to take advantage of those, too. Then you hope you've built a strong enough roster that they can manage and handle some of the distractions that exist in college football.

But these guys are used to it. They're tough. They're resilient. They've dealt with it before. I think every one of them recognize how special it is to be a part -- there's only eight teams left right now, and after this game there will be four teams left. To be a part of something like that doesn't happen a lot in anybody's lifetime. I hope they recognize the importance of that, the opportunity for that. Then the academic calendar is something we all have plans for, and we'll be ready to adjust and adapt as we go. But that's college football over the last four years that I've been a part of it as a head coach is adapt, and you have to being to adapt and adjust, and there will be some learning lessons this year, this off-season that we learn, just like there were last season that we'll continue to adapt to.

Q. Coach Lanning, almost 24 hours away from kickoff; where is this team's mentality at maybe compared to where it was last year?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, you know, you always try to overanalyze that as a coach. You walk in and guys are laughing and you're like, wait a minute, are we too loose. You walk in the room and everybody is quiet and you're like, okay, are we too tight. I really like where our team is at, their temperament. When they step on the field, it's business. They enjoy spending time with each other. They've had a really clear focus throughout the week, and the result is going to be the result.

We've got two really good teams going against each other head-to-head, talent on both sides,



good coaches on both sides. So ultimately you want the players to go out there and take the opportunity to go win the game on their own, and I like where our guys are at. I think they've been really focused.

I think, again, the repetition of us, the rhythm for us has been a factor that will contribute in this game for us to be able to keep the sequence as much as possible, similar for our players.

But I really like where their head is at, I really like their focus, and it's hard to maintain focus at that age for as long as you have to maintain focus in college football right now, so excited to see that result.

Q. Coach McGuire, you talked about Coach Morton and what that moment meant for you. I know you're worried about your team, but have you given any thought what this would mean to all of the planes full of Red Raider fans, the guys driving cross country and documenting that, what this moment will mean for the Texas Tech fan base as a whole if you guys can follow through and get a win tomorrow?

JOEY McGUIRE: Yeah, it's going to be incredible. One of the coolest things throughout this journey is after the Big 12 game how many letters and emails I've received from Texas Tech fans and guys that played -- some lettermen saying how proud they are and they've been waiting for however long for a team like this.

It's going to mean a lot, but we have focused every single week on being in the moment and being where our feet are. This is a game that's a huge game, but our guys know what's at stake.

But I do carry that and feel that and am excited that there's been a lot of cool moments this year

that Red Raiders have been excited about. I know they're really excited.

We've got a big group coming out, and it's going to be -- I think Red Raiders always show up, and we'll have a good crowd.

We're going to do everything we can to play really well tomorrow.

Q. Coach McGuire, most people in America today are waiting for that ball to drop for 2026. Talk about your focus, mindset and trying to keep all the noise out as the ball drops for you guys in about 24 and a half hours for the biggest game in Red Raider history.

JOEY McGUIRE: Yeah, we're going to be on our normal Friday schedule. We'll have this Fast Friday today and then we'll have all our meetings and we'll eat as a team, and then we're going to go watch a movie and be back for our team meeting and be in the hotel room.

I think Cody Campbell and John Sellers are having a big New Year's Eve party tonight and I'm sure my wife is going, but I won't be thinking much about -- I imagine I'm going to be up, but it's only because Dan is going to keep me up because I'm going to be worried about the Oregon Ducks. It's not going to be because I'm trying to bring in the new year. I'll probably be looking at the ceiling and thinking about tomorrow and making sure I've checked all the boxes to make sure that my guys are ready to roll.

Exciting, and man, it's so cool. I did look up -- and Bob Stoops is a good friend of mine, so of course he commented that he's coached in this game and won it, and I did look up. Man, it's really cool, the different guys, the who's-who have coached in the Orange Bowl. For Joey



McGuire, an ol' high school coach, to be able to coach in this game and bring the Red Raiders in the College Football Playoffs, it's pretty cool. We're really excited about it.

Q. Dan, you've already talked about getting reps for your guys. This is the third straight January 1st bowl game you guys have played. How can the last two years, the experiences and the distractions and dealing with all that help you for this week?

DAN LANNING: Playing football makes you better at football, and playing in big moments makes you better at playing in big moments. Our team certainly has played in a lot of big moments.

It's funny, you don't sit back and really think about what you've been able to accomplish because you're always worried about what's next. But this is the winningest group in Oregon history over their four years. There's some new faces in there, too, some guys that weren't necessarily there for the entire ride, but there's been a standard created and an expectation created for this group, and now it's about taking the next step.

Really excited. We want these guys to lean on their experience and what they've been able to do. Again, they've prepped really well, and obviously you're playing a great team. At this point, there aren't any bad teams. You're playing great teams from here on out. Really excited about seeing our guys go out there and execute.

THE MODERATOR: Well, thank you, both coaches. We know you have a very busy schedule. At this time we'll ask that you take your place over in front of the CapitalOne Orange Bowl trophy for a photo opportunity.

Q. Coach, 25 days between games; how does it feel to actually be here finally?

JOEY McGUIRE: Yeah, we're really excited. Like this morning we were doing our walk-through, and I was proud of the way the guys were handling it, but man, we are ready to play. I think they've walked through our game plan as much as possible, and we still have a fast Friday tomorrow and then we have another walk-through on game day.

Feel good where we're at, but we're ready to play.

Q. How do you avoid the lull having had so much time off?

JOEY McGUIRE: Yeah, one, I think it's very important for us to start well in the game. I think one thing we also have to do is we've got to weather their storm. They started really fast

against James Madison, so we've got to do a good job of weathering their storm.

That's one thing that I think as a whole we have to take a look at the structure we have at this level of College Football Playoff that really need to change. But it is what it is right now, so we've got to do a great job of handling it, and we really do need to start really fast.

Q. Y'all don't play on a lot of natural grass fields. I know the players probably like it a little bit better. What do they think of that?

JOEY McGUIRE: Yeah, we're lucky we have that grass field at home. It's going to be a little different because our grass is probably not as tight as what we're going to play on. We played at Arizona State this year, and they've got as good a grass field as there is in the country. They say this is a really fast track, so we're excited about that.



We called out here and talked to some of the equipment guys for the Dolphins, and of course we've got a couple of Red Raiders that are Dolphin players, so we expect to be able to wear our normal molded cleats versus our grass cleats, so we're excited about that.

Q. What sticks out to you about Oregon on tape?

JOEY McGUIRE: The effort they play with, which is doesn't surprise me. I'm a big fan of Coach Lanning, and I think he's an effort-based guy with the people that he coached for and how he's grown up in this coaching world.

But how hard they play, and then they're extremely athletic. They've got great team speed, and they've got really good big-time playmakers, so that really jumps off film.

Q. Since Texas Tech hasn't played in this setting before, how much pressure do you feel for the university?

JOEY McGUIRE: I think it's a mixture of not just us performing at a high level Texas Tech-wise, but for the Big 12. I've talked to Commissioner Yormark multiple times over the last few weeks, and man, I know we're not only just representing the TT but we're representing the Big 12.

I think it's important. But the one thing about this team, man, they love playing the game. They love playing football together. We're just going to go out and do what we've done all year long and try to play at a really high level, execute the game plan.

But there is a -- I don't think they feel it, but I definitely feel it. It's important that we perform, and it's important that we win the football game, not only for Texas Tech but for the Big 12.

Q. What were some of the challenges of getting 21 transfers --

JOEY McGUIRE: Well, I think it's important that you do as much as possible. Gus Malzahn is a really good friend of mine; so I can call Gus and say, "Tell me about Lee Hunter." And Mack Brown is a really good friend of mine; so it was easy to pick up the phone with Mack and say, "Tell me about Howard Sampson."

I think it's important whenever you're going through and putting a team together that you do your research, and then I feel like we have some really good things in place to build a culture. And Lubbock, Texas, is a great place to be. It's a college town. That town is built around the TT.

So I think the players, whenever they get there, they really feel the love of the community. So I think that's been really important to building this team.

Q. It seems like you're the same guy. How have you stayed true to who you are as the stage has changed?

JOEY McGUIRE: My biggest thing, I learned this a long time ago, I had a great mentor. I've had great mentors. It's really cool, I saw one of our fans put it out because Nick Saban has got such a great tree represented in this College Football Playoff.

And I learned from Robert Woods, who's a Hall of Fame Texas high school coach, one of the greatest coaches of all times. I learned from him and then my first AD, Gina Farmer. If you make it about the players and they genuinely feel that and they understand how much you care about them, then you can do some incredible things as a group.



Man, that's the thing; I tell parents, I tell anybody that comes to Texas Tech whenever they visit that I wake up every morning, and my job is to make these guys the best version of themselves. And if you keep that in the forefront, then a lot of good things can happen, and winning is a byproduct of that.

That's just what I've always believed. January, starting in January will start my 32nd year of coaching, and no matter if it's a 22-year-old or it's a 16-year-old that you're coaching, they're all the same. They're playing a kid's game that they absolutely love, and they want to do great things. I just try to help them do that.

Q. What's the key to victory for Texas Tech?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, we've got to do a great job of stopping the run. These guys run at such a high level, so we've got to do a good job of stopping the run. Whoever wins the turnover battle, you've got two explosive offenses, so who can give their offense an extra couple possessions.

And I think we've got to make plays on special teams. That's where we've been from really all of our victories this year, but especially Arizona State, after that loss, we've done a great job of stopping the run, creating turnovers. I think Indiana and Texas Tech are the No. 1 team in the country in turnover margin. We're plus 17. And then playing really well on special teams. I think those are the keys to this game.

Q. Having played so many other games, I think this will be (indiscernible).

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, it's kind of been -- whatever the first game was this year, and we had a couple last year, but the 11:00 kicks, we have played extremely well. We had a couple

early this season, and I started saying, man, we're the best 11:00 a.m. team in the country. Then all of a sudden we'd get another 11:00 a.m. game, and that's really in your wheelhouse.

You'd kind of like a 2:30 kick because it's early and you can get your juices flowing but it's not too late to where you've got to sit around in the hotel all day long.

These guys, whenever they said we were going to play in the Orange Bowl, I said, man, it's 12:00 here but it's 11:00 a.m. Central Time, and we've played really well at 11:00 a.m. I think whenever you've had success like that, you can push that message, and we'll be ready to go.

Q. The Utah game was 10:00 a.m., right?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, 10:00 a.m., that was an early kick. That was a little bit earlier. But still, I think that's one thing, whenever you go that way, they're not used to playing at 10:00 a.m. their time ever. That's usually whenever you go to the West Coast for some reason, that's usually a night game. That's really tough to play in.

But we've got that 10:00 a.m. kick, and I thought that was an advantage for us.

Q. How about with the kids, just get them up, get something to eat and go play ball?

JOEY MCGUIRE: Yeah, we're excited. It's funny, if you come to our hotel this morning -- if you came this morning and if you come on game day, we've got blue lights. So we've got blue lights set up on the table while they're eating breakfast waking them up and getting them going.

We practice Thursday and Friday morning pretty early. When we're in pads, we're an afternoon practice team, but Thursday and



Friday we practice pretty early in the morning. So our guys are used to getting up and getting going.

Q. (Indiscernible) sustainable for Texas Tech. What does that mean to you?

JOEY McGUIRE: Man, he was on the interview committee, and the day I sat with him and felt his passion about Texas Tech, he said, "I'm all in, wherever college athletics is going, we're going to be all in," I knew that it could be really special.

The thing that -- I read an article yesterday about Cody, and the thing that I just keep saying, the more and more people that listen to Cody Campbell, the better off college athletics is going to be. I know some of the commissioners have been really -- not threatened but not necessarily agreeing with him, and they think he really doesn't see the big picture.

Get in the room with him. Don't throw stones at him outside the room, but when you're in the room with him, you'll understand, he's smarter than you. Not only that, I heard Kirby Hocutt, our AD, his high school coach said this. Cody has wore a jock. Cody not only is an incredible businessman, but he played this game at an extremely high level, a higher level than any commissioner than I know of.

It's not only did he play this game, but he's also so intelligent whenever it comes to the business world that I think if we could really get behind some of his ideas and do it as a collective, we're better athletically.

But your question, man, he went all in. And I told him. I said, "Man, we'll do everything that we can to make you right," and we to this point

have made him right as far as him going all in behind us.

Q. (Indiscernible) level, though?

JOEY McGUIRE: I know this sounds crazy, but man, I just believe -- I was at a place that I never won a playoff game in the history of the school. They started playing in 1932, and they didn't win a playoff game until 2006. Four years later we went 16-0. I do believe what we do and the way we do things produces a winning program.

When they hired me four years ago, so it's really cool, year four, we go 16-0 year four, we're in the College Football Playoffs, I really felt like we could be successful. It really helps whenever you have the backing that we have of Cody Campbell, John Sellers, Dusty Womble, Mike Wallace, Gary Petersen. Those are kind of the big five that have really been the push, and then all of Texas Tech behind us.

Q. Do you feel like after those guys got into it, your job (indiscernible)?

JOEY McGUIRE: I think if you're not so self-driven that the pressure could really get to you because now the expectations raise from the outside. But man, somebody was telling me whenever we got to the Big 12, they were like, man, this is a big deal, or maybe it was before the Big 12 because they were talking about contract extension. And I said, look, if we don't win the Big 12, then I don't want to talk about contract extension because I've failed.

That's not anything to do with how they felt. It's how I felt. I'm my worst critic, besides my wife sometimes. It's one of those deals I think if you're self-driven, then the outside expectations are not going to bother you because you have -- your expectations of yourself are so high.



Q. What about the part where you have to integrate (indiscernible) from the outside, manage it, bring them into that expectation environment? Is that something you have dealt with?

JOEY McGUIRE: I think anytime, at any level that you're at, whenever you start winning, the expectation just goes up. Whenever I got hired in 2003 at Cedar Hill, one of the things that came out in the "Dallas Morning News," which is the biggest newspaper in Texas, was they let a Hall of Fame high school coach go because he didn't win enough games. So I knew right then if I didn't win enough games, I was going to be fired.

I think no matter -- that's your livelihood no matter what level it is, then you still feel the pressure of winning. That's kind of how I've always felt.

Q. How has your team grown since the two programs played in 2023?

JOEY McGUIRE: I'm really proud of our coaching staff. The one thing I'm really proud of, if you look, the players that we have on our team are playing their best football in their career. So I'm really proud of our coaching staff. I think we've grown as a coaching staff.

Then I think the guys that were in that game are older, and that was Ben Roberts, he was a redshirt freshman. I think our talent level on our roster is higher, but I think theirs is, too.

It's really hard when you look at Oregon and you look at us, it's almost like you're looking in the mirror. We're very similar football teams.

Q. The football we've grown up watching, a game played two years ago (indiscernible) maybe not the case in today's day and age?

JOEY McGUIRE: Yeah, really whenever I look at that roster or look at that game, there was guys on the roster that were there but they weren't playing yet. Jacob Rodriguez didn't get to play in that game because he got hurt the week before. That was Ben Roberts' very first start. But the roster between the guys that we have, they were young, and then the guys that -- kind of the turnover of the roster, it's very different.

But I think it's very different for them, too. I don't look across the field and see a lot of guys that played in that game on their team, either.

Jadarian has done offensively for us overall as a unit, making explosive plays when he got opportunities, and in picking up the team at times and I think of Texas A & M pops to my brain. And there's a bunch of other ones too, that where he just where we were a little bit bogged down, he gave us a spark. And I know he's anxious to prove that he's that type of guy that can be that consistent on every snap, and he has that ability. I don't know that it would change us offensively all that much. Obviously, you don't want to not have Jeremiah Love, if at all possible, but we feel confident with whoever we put in there."

Mack Leftwich, Offensive Coordinator

MACK LEFTWICH: My dad was a coach, college coach for a long time, and that was one of his coaching buddies, now runs a podcast really for high school coaches in Arkansas. So it was just such kind of a unique thing, and that was my brother's bachelor party.

Q. It was your brother's bachelor party?



MACK LEFTWICH: It was my brother's bachelor party, and Coach Williams, who runs this podcast, has been wanting to get my dad and my brother and me for a podcast the last couple years. So it was like: We're all going to be in the same spot; you can come down here, and we can film this thing. So we started off the bachelor party with the podcast.

Anyways, that was just a question that he asked. I think he was trying to poke the bear a little bit and get me and my brother talking some smack to each other.

Q. Where was the bachelor party?

MACK LEFTWICH: It was in San Marcos, so there in Central Texas. (Indiscernible) at Texas State the year before, and Cutter loves that area, and we went and floated the river and hung out in San Marcos. So it was a real guys' weekend.

Q. Since he spoke it into existence, how does it feel that you're days away now from playing against each other?

MACK LEFTWICH: Pretty surreal. It'll be really a cool moment, I think, pregame when we go out there and get to kind of dap each other up. It's like, man, this is pretty cool. We're both living our dream. Both of us grew up watching our dad coaching and wanting to be coaches, so pretty awesome to do it on this stage.

Q. How are your parents going to handle this?

MACK LEFTWICH: My dad is pretty cool, calm and collected. I think my mom might be a little bit of a wreck. She's pretty conflicted on how to root for the game. I'm sure she's hoping for probably their O-line to play well and our offense to score points.

Q. Does she have a shirt where she's going to put both --

MACK LEFTWICH: She's got a shirt. My wife had it made, so it's got Texas Tech and the little Raider Red and Oregon with the Duck, so she'll be supporting both teams.

Q. In talking to your dad about the massive influence he's had on your career, from your perspective, what do you think was his biggest game?

MACK LEFTWICH: He's coached in a couple of conference championships. I know they won one when he was at Tulsa and ended up playing in the Liberty Bowl when he was at Pittsburgh. The Backyard Brawl against West Virginia is always a huge game.

But I think that, too, that gives me and my brother an appreciation for being here. We saw how hard my dad worked, and he coached in college for 30 years and never had an opportunity to coach in the game of this magnitude. Pretty awesome for both of us to do it here and for my dad to be able to be here in the stands and get to watch it.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

MACK LEFTWICH: We've kept it pretty cordial. I think our wives are actually on a cruise together right now, so they're --

Q. Out of Miami, I hope?

MACK LEFTWICH: Yeah, the wives did like a little wives' cruise this morning, so they're hanging out together right now.

Q. Are they going to get back in one day, two days --



MACK LEFTWICH: It's like a little lunch cruise, one of those type of things. We're all hanging out. I think I'm going to try to get dinner together as a family, kind of -- we still love each other. For about three hours after kickoff we'll be competitors.

Q. He does claim the better beard. Do you want to confirm that?

MACK LEFTWICH: He does have a good beard. I might give him that one. I'll give him that one.

Q. Who's the bigger trash talker?

MACK LEFTWICH: I'd probably say probably growing up, it had to have been me. I feel like I won more, so when you're winning you just have the ability to talk more trash. So probably me.

Q. This rivalry, once you found out that it was going to be Oregon, did it bring back any memories for you guys when you were younger, that sibling rivalry between you two?

MACK LEFTWICH: A little bit. Kind of just the back-and-forth that we had because that's -- we grew up with three boys. I'm the oldest, Cutter, and then we have a younger brother. There wasn't very many dull moments at the house. My mom always jokes everything turned into a weapon at the house so you're naturally wrestling around and competing at everything that you do. That was just kind of our life growing up.

Shiel Wood, Defensive Coordinator

Q. How unusual is it (indiscernible)?

SHIEL WOOD: Oh, gosh, that's a great question. I don't know how unusual it is, but I do think (indiscernible) first year getting the defensive

staff on the same page and tying it in with our players, to that extent it doesn't matter. I'm in my first year at Texas Tech. Our staff is in our first year.

So whether guys will return as players to Texas Tech or new to Texas Tech was irrelevant from the standpoint of our defensive system was new to all of them. So it was a challenge in year one, and the credit goes to our staff and our players, just the tremendous buy-in, their talent level, their ability. Our staff are great teachers, great students of the game, understand concepts.

Our guys have bought in, and the players have been outstanding. To be able to do all that in the first year has been tremendous.

I do think now kind of with the last several years of college football and more player movement that, to a certain extent, depending on where you're at, you've got to build a team each year. And maybe in years past it was more of an established program, then you could kind of bring guys from high school and develop over a several-year period.

I think now sometimes it's a little bit more of you've got to be ready defensively to build a new team each year because you have new players filling in for you.

Q. Why do you think it's working?

SHIEL WOOD: I think that our success is attributed to several things, but I think it starts with the leadership of Joey McGuire and the culture that he had already established in our building and in our program with our players already in the locker room.

I think that this is an extremely positive environment. He is a tremendous guy. He's the



same individual, a consistent leader. So these guys know what to expect. They know what they're going to get from him. He just really creates this environment that's fun to work in every day, whether you're a player or a coach.

Then our guys, I think we have done -- Coach McGuire has done a great job with our staff of bringing in really good football players but also really good people that are high character, hardworking, love the game of football. And we've been blessed with some of the new guys that come in this year from other schools, that transferred in, are cut from that same cloth.

I think collectively in that locker room, we're a player-led team. We talk about that all the time, and I think we've got tremendous leadership, and they have just done a great job of bonding together and working their rear ends off, and that's why we've had the success we have.

Beren Morton, QB

BEHREN MORTON: I think it's going to be a great match-up. I think Oregon is very talented. They're really good up front. I think they do a lot of good things on defense. I think they're fundamentally sound. I think that they are assigned well and they do their job. But we've got a high-powered offense. We've got a lot of playmakers on the field, too.

I'm excited for the game. I think it's a great opportunity for Lubbock, too. I think Lubbock deserves a game like this, and I think there's going to be a lot of Red Raiders here, too, so it's going to be a lot of fun.

Q. Everybody talks about Alabama, Ohio State. Who is Texas Tech, and what makes them a contender for the National Championship?

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, I think it goes back to our head guy. I think Coach McGuire has done a phenomenal job of (indiscernible). I really think our culture is top-notch. I think what he's trying to build here at Texas Tech is something really special.

There's some really good people in West Texas for sure, and I think that's what elevates Lubbock for sure.

Q. When you saw the destination for the bowl game, Miami, were you thinking of coming here --

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, for sure. To get to play in 80-degree weather and the facilities we get to use here has been awesome. The people of the Orange Bowl have been great, and I know the guys have enjoyed the trip for sure.

Q. How much have you watched of Oregon?

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, I've watched a lot. I do think that they're a very talented team. I think that there's ways that we can get the ball to J'Koby Williams in the backfield. Cameron Dickey, a power back. I think there's different ways to attack them.

I think having the bye that we've had, 20-something days since we've played, I think it's helped us get guys back healthy. Myself, I think it's been really beneficial having this bye for sure.

Q. After all that time off, like you said, getting guys rested up, is there almost a rust factor to start the game?

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, for sure. There's going to be a lot of nerves at the beginning of the game. It's a big game. But at the end of the day,



it's football, and once the ball is spotted, we'll get comfortable with it.

But Coach McGuire has done a great job of -- we're practicing five days a week. We got to go home for Christmas for a couple days, but that's about it. Just staying in shape, getting ready for the game.

Q. Do you feel like you have to match Oregon's explosiveness or lean on your defense which is pretty good with the guys you have?

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, for sure. There's no reason to do anything out of the ordinary. Play the next play. My job, keep it simple, get the ball to playmakers, let them do the work in the open field.

But our defense is a great defense. It's been all year that we're not sitting on the sideline for long. To have the defense that we have, it's very securing for sure.

Q. How do you see the match-up between you and Dante?

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, I have a lot of respect for Dante. He's a phenomenal player. We're actually part of the same agency. I know a little bit about him. But he's a phenomenal player and a great person, too.

Q. Having some time off, what's that allowed you to do the last few weeks?

BEHREN MORTON: Yeah, this whole bowl prep has been really good for me. I've been basically 100 percent in practice as far as team reps. I haven't been able to do team reps really all season long. Been in the boot for probably about seven weeks, eight weeks throughout the season. Got out of the boot -- I'd been wearing the boot.

Just getting the body back to playing football again. It's been a while since I've gotten to do that. I think it's been good that we've had this time off.

Coy Eakin, WR

Q. How does it feel to finally be here after a few weeks off getting ready for the game?

COY EAKIN: It feels good. The whole team, we practice a lot. Feels good to finally be here. I wish the game was tomorrow or today. I'm just anxious. I hate being anxious.

Q. So you grew up in Texas, you kind of know the history of the program. The Orange Bowl is almost 100 years old. This is the first time that Texas Tech has ever played in the Orange Bowl. How does that talk about the development and the good things that are going on big picture?

COY EAKIN: Oh, it's amazing. This team and the past couple teams have set the new norm for Texas Tech, especially with the transfer portal being how it is, how we're able to come together with the transfer portal with a team like this.

Q. How do you see the Oregon defense matching up?

COY EAKIN: It's like playing our own defense every day at home.

Q. Texas Tech offense, is there anything in particular that sort of makes the offense click, that makes you guys --

COY EAKIN: I think just the bond of the team. We're all pretty close. Me and Behren have always been good friends. We live 45 minutes away from each other. We take one as if they have been there their whole career. It's just a bond, a closeness that we have with the team.



Q. What's your favorite part about Coach?

COY EAKIN: Realness. The person you see every day is what you get.

Q. Big 12 this year, you kind of ran through it. Even like BYU and some of the other top teams, you just rolled over them. Does that give you the momentum and confidence coming into the playoffs?

COY EAKIN: Yeah, it's a confidence every time you go into a big game, you come out victorious and you come out with a dominant victory, especially when our defense backs us all up. But yeah, we have a lot of confidence going into every game we play.

Cameron Dickey, RB

Q. After so many early games, what advantage do you have over a team like Oregon that's only played one early this year?

CAMERON DICKY: You know, Coach says we're great at early games. We are. First of all, I like to wake up and just get going for a game. We all thrive on early games, so it's going to be awesome.

Q. You guys only played on one natural grass field earlier this year. What's going to be different about that?

CAMERON DICKY: We look forward to playing on grass, so I feel like that's (indiscernible).

Q. What was practice like this morning?

CAMERON DICKY: Practice this morning was down at FAU. Saw a few of the coaches from a few years ago that are out there now, some of the guys. We were really locked in, felt good

outside. We had a great walk-through. Everyone was just locked in.

Q. You've had a long layoff. How do you avoid a slow start?

CAMERON DICKY: I think Coach has a great plan. We've been very active, been practicing a lot. We've had a few days off, which has been nice, as well. But yeah, just staying active, and I think we're going to do great.

Q. (On what you like about Miami.)

CAMERON DICKY: Love Miami. Great weather, the breeze, ocean view. It's nice.

J'Koby Williams, RB

Q. You finished up that Big 12 Championship, playing in a big bowl game, the Orange Bowl. What's scared you about this defense?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: You know, they've got a good defense, but I'm pretty sure we're prepared. We worked real hard. We had a lot of practices. I'm pretty sure we're going to be okay.

Q. What's unique about your running style and your running offense?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: Our offense is pretty good. My running style, I just like getting in space, getting as much as I can in space.

Q. What do you like to tell people about your team?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: That we're just real close. We play as a team. As long as you worry about us, we're good.

Q. This bowl game coming to fruition, talk about that.



J'KOBY WILLIAMS: Being here in Miami is really amazing. I've never been here, so it's all new to me. I'm happy to be here. We just kept preaching, it's about us. Thankful to the Lubbock community. They had a big role in our season this year.

Q. What was it like when you guys saw -- when you were doing the selection show and you saw you were No. 4? What was the feeling like as a team?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: That feeling was great. Just seeing that on the board shows you how hard -- it just shows how hard we worked. We deserved to be there. Just happy to be here. I'm ready to go. Everybody is.

Q. What did you guys think of -- I'm sure you guys were watching the James Madison-Oregon game. What was your first reaction when Oregon won?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: They're both really good teams. I think we had our minds set on who we were going to play already, and we're here now.

Q. Is there anything that you're looking forward to in this game that you haven't been able to experience so far in your career?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: I mean, playing in the Dolphins stadium. It'll be really fun playing in the stadium.

Q. Have you played in an NFL stadium before?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: I'm not sure.

Q. When you played Oklahoma State, you had that huge kickoff return. What were you thinking?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: When I fielded the ball, I hit the hole. When I seen I had broke that first tackle, I was ready to just get on the horse and get to the end zone.

Q. How do you manage your time between practice and schoolwork?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: You know, we usually have a schedule that we have, so we'll probably practice in the morning, I'll probably go to rehab, do all that. I'll go eat, and then I'll have class. So I'll be studying for that. Just do it like that.

Q. What do you do when you have to travel?

J'KOBY WILLIAMS: When we travel, we usually bring our computers, so any work that we get for the week, we just finish it there. We get it done pretty good.

Jacob Rodriguez, LB

Q. Have you seen any similarities between you guys? You give up very few points, very few yards, they give up very few points, very few yards. You score a lot, they score a lot. Do you see similarities?

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: Yeah, of course. I think first of all, we're a really good team, so that kind of shows up. But I think they're one of the best in the country, as well.

They're a very good football team, so I think it's accurate that both teams will kind of match up well and the numbers will be pretty similar just because of -- especially offensively, our style of offense and their style of offense, they want to make a lot of downfield plays and explosive plays, so I think it would make sense that it matches up.



Q. What's it been like waiting for this game to get here?

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: It's been different. I think it feels like fall camp all over again, and it feels like you're going through it week to week but there's no scrimmage and there's no game to play. You have all these questions that you just never get answered.

You don't know if it's best to move on from that, that specific call or game plan and move to the next, or it's just kind of doing the same thing over and over. So you just don't know if you're right or wrong, so you could be prepping for the wrong thing. You just never know. That's the hardest part.

But it was nice to have the time off and get guys healthy, but the prep was pretty weird.

Q. As a linebacker, when you look at Oregon, what do you see?

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: I see a massive offensive line who is very good with their hands, very good with their feet, and then I see a quarterback who's arguably the best in the country, and then receivers and running backs who can go the distance. Their speed jumps off the page, and they're very explosive. If we can just do our job and do what we can to stop the explosive plays, that's what we're going to try to do.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: I mean, I think we just do what we've been doing all year, just trying to attack the ball using our leverage and just doing stuff that we've been coached to do all season long and keep proper shoulders, proper feet, proper hands.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: I guess I don't know exactly how they do it yet. I hope that I can give you an answer after the game. We're just looking forward to a great match-up against a great team. Yeah, we've definitely looked into that and tried to study why that happened last year and what we can do to prevent it, and I think we've had a good plan up until this point, and I'm excited for it.

Q. (On Oregon's run game.)

JACOB RODRIGUEZ: I mean, all of their running backs that they play are incredible, and they can go the distance at any point. Then it really helps when you have an O-line who is as big and as strong as they are and use their feet as well as they do.

But then I think it comes down to their quarterback play. I think what I see from them is their quarterback is checking them at the line and putting them into the right play, putting them into good positions for them to win.

They may pick up a few yards, but it'll open the door to bigger and longer runs as the game goes on because they're just checking into the right play.

David Bailey, DE

Q. Talk about coming down here to Miami for the game.

DAVID BAILEY: Yeah, this is my first time in Miami. I love the weather. It kind of reminds me a little bit of Southern California. It's a great environment, and obviously I'm having a lot of fun with the team. It's a business trip so we've got to lock in on what we've got to do, but we're having a lot of fun.



Q. I know this is your first year at Texas Tech. Can you touch on the decision to transfer from Stanford as well as (indiscernible)?

DAVID BAILEY: Yeah, so my original goal was to finish at Stanford, and then obviously when I did that, I entered the portal, and then I didn't really know where I was going. I was kind of ignorant to that until (indiscernible) had notified me what they were doing. So I kind of did my research, talking to my agency, and ended up making a deal.

Q. Pretty nice playing in Hard Rock Stadium?

DAVID BAILEY: Oh, yeah, man, I'm taking it in. The Big 12 Championship was amazing, too. That was an insane environment, and I know it's going to be something similar here, so I'm just taking it in.

Q. How are you adjusting to hearing your name in mock drafts? Are you just trying to stay focused?

DAVID BAILEY: Maybe Caleb Williams a little bit. I don't know. He has a unique play style. I know he likes to stay in the pocket a little bit

more and rely on his passing ability. He's super talented.

Q. When you look at Oregon's offense as a whole, how do they compare to some other teams you saw this year?

DAVID BAILEY: Yeah, obviously they have a great offense like Utah and BYU. But I don't think they really have a weak area in terms of the O-line or skill players. I'm looking forward to the challenge.

Q. You've seen video on Oregon's offense. How does that work for the linebackers like yourself?



LEE HUNTER: They're good. They're good at what they do. A very good football team. We're lucky to have a very great coaching staff, so it just comes down to who wants it more.

Q. Obviously at the beginning of the season, did you ever think that you'd be at this position right now to play for a National Championship?

LEE HUNTER: No, I haven't. I haven't. It's such a blessing being able to -- I never knew I was going to have this opportunity to play at this level. It's really a blessing. I'm so thankful. But it's time to go show the world how good we really are.

Romello Height, LB

ROMELLO HEIGHT: Honestly, man, just they made me feel like family as soon as I walked in the door. It felt like I had been here for all my years of college because of how they made me feel.

DAN LANNING: Certainly excited to be here at the Orange Bowl. Definitely pumped to play a great Texas Tech team. Got a lot of respect for Coach McGuire and the job he does. We just wrapped up a practice, and enjoying our time so far in Miami.

Q. What's the keys to victory for you guys?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, play our game. We've got two really good teams. Can't go out there thinking about making mistakes. Have to go out there and execute and do your job. Two explosive offenses, two defenses that have played really well throughout the season.

But ultimately we've got an elite quarterback. We've got a team that plays really well together. We need that to show up in this game.

Q. Does it feel different preparing for a quarterfinal?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, definitely different. I think that's been a benefit for our players, staying in sequence, in rhythm. It's a lot easier to maintain that rhythm for us. But definitely a difference.

Q. Coming off a big win, getting to take that momentum into the next game, how much different was that than last year?

DAN LANNING: We came off a big win from the Big Ten Championship the year before. It's just a lot of time in between. There isn't a lot of time to think, which is good. In my opinion, playoff games should be played in sequential order and really quickly. I think that allowed for a little bit more of that rhythm this year for us, which is good.

Q. I know you guys have had one 9:00 a.m. this year. How do you prepare for that?

DAN LANNING: We practice every morning in the morning. That's kind of our sequence. This will be like 9:00 a.m. for us. That's normally



right when we're hitting the practice field. So not that different.

Obviously we got out here yesterday with a little bit of time to prepare and kind of get in rhythm with what the time difference feels like. Got our players up this morning ready to roll. I think it's something we'll be ready for.

Q. So far the Big Ten is 5-0, undefeated (indiscernible) what does that say about the conference?

DAN LANNING: I think the record itself speaks for the conference, the quality of players and coaches and teams in this conference. I definitely think the Big Ten is the best conference in college football. Last two National Championships have indicated that as well.

It's a good opportunity, some good teams, good Big Ten teams still playing football right now, and I hope they show up.

Q. They're 17-plus in the turnover margin. How do you not feed into that?

DAN LANNING: I think the biggest credit to that belongs to their defense and the way they attack the ball. Even when it might be credited as a missed tackle, that's because they're punching and attacking the ball.

They do as good a job of anybody that we played in attacking the ball. We have to do a great job of protecting it. And then it's kind of a competition between our defense and their defense on who can create takeaways.

Q. On Gary's injuries and bringing him back --

DAN LANNING: Yeah, ultimately injuries this year have really played a part in our theme of the season, which is strength in numbers and

being able to lean on guys that can go play winning football for you.

We have a lot of guys that can do that, and we have coaches that are doing a good job of being able to adapt. When you get guys back, you want to figure out how you can get back in rhythm and be able to utilize those players. But it won't change some of the things that we've been able to create over the last few weeks.

Q. Losing two of your coordinators, how much does that --

DAN LANNING: Yeah, one thing, I'll give great credit to Coach Stein and Coach Lupoi. They've worked their tails off. You wouldn't know a difference that they're taking other jobs. They're spending a lot of time at night working on the job that they're about to go into. But they're spending a lot of time during the day on the job that they have and the job that they feel responsible for towards our players. They've worked extremely hard, and the players around them have prepared really, really hard, which has been awesome to see.

Q. (Indiscernible) about that part of success as a head coach, how you have to keep doing this or you have to keep doing that?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, it's always been on the forefront of my mind. It's something you want to happen in a program. I think it speaks to a healthy program when coaches get opportunities. I've certainly leaned on some other people on how they've helped handle that situation and what it has to look like.

I think the biggest thing is you can't cheat the players. It's something that they've earned, they deserve. We've got to be able to give them our



best and adapt to make sure we can give them our best.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

DAN LANNING: Bo is doing great, man. It really fires me up. I think everybody knows I'm a Chiefs fan. But if it's not the Chiefs, I'd love to see an Oregon Duck go take care of business, and Bo has been doing an outstanding job.

Q. What's the overarching message to the team this week?

DAN LANNING: Play your game, real simple. I'm not getting into our theme of the week, but ultimately go out there and execute the way you're meant to do. What you've shown us a million times in practice, let it show up on the field.

Q. (Indiscernible) did he have a setback?

DAN LANNING: No, no setback. We just like moving Evan up and down so you guys talk about it instead of talking about our team.

Q. What do you think the advantage is of having a game under your belt?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, I think it helps you keep your rhythm, keep your rhythm when you get an opportunity to keep playing football. If you have a long break, it's hard to keep the rhythm and the focus for your players.

Q. What concerns you about Tech's offense?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, again, explosive offense. They have receivers outside that can win. They've got running backs that are really good in the run game, a quarterback that makes great decisions, tight ends show up in the passing game.

They're able to play with tempo, which will be a challenge at times. That means you have to line up and get the call in play. Ultimately they're really efficient.

Q. Talk about the importance of the strong start and being able to land the first punch --

DAN LANNING: Yeah, one, Tech is a really strong team. Even if you look at them deep in the fourth quarter, they've really beat their teams by a heavy margin in the fourth quarter. So it's about playing a fourth-quarter battle, but that starts with starting fast. We've been a really good team when we start fast. We've got to be a team that can play all four quarters in this game.

Q. What was the hardest part of that long layoff last season?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, just the time, maintaining focus, the transition, all the things that go on with the portal. At that time the portal was already open. A lot of things exist in that window that makes it difficult, but everybody is dealing with it.

Q. What do you feel like is different about this team that you have this year?

DAN LANNING: I'd certainly say strength in numbers, just the amount of players that we can play. The depth of our roster is certainly different. The mindset, the maturity of our players, it really sticks out to me.

Q. (Indiscernible)?

DAN LANNING: There's always pressure, and you want pressure. We expect to go win this game. It's going to be tough because Texas Tech



I promise expects to go win this game. But that's something you sign up for.

Q. Coming to South Florida, what's the team --

DAN LANNING: We love Florida. We love Florida. There's a lot of great talent here. Our offensive line coach, Coach Terry, was talking about wearing an Orange Bowl outfit as a kid, working this same bowl game for a long time as a kid. We have some great players on our team from Florida. We always want to recruit the best, and there's some really good players here in this area. It's an area that we want to do a good job in.

Q. What are you looking most forward to come game day?

DAN LANNING: The game. We get into coaching, there's a lot of things that go outside of that. You get in the opportunity to coach because you want to influence players, you want to make an impact on guys, and then you want a chance to coach in great games like this.

Q. How do you keep guys -- at the end of the day they're college kids, but they're athletes, great at what they do. How do you keep them locked in in a place like Miami? I'm sure they have great friendships, but how do you keep them serious?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, I think all of us here are different. It's not like your typical bowl game five years ago. The opportunity to keep playing, to take care of business in this game is one that's really important.

When we talk about sacrifice with our team, you're willing to sacrifice some things so you can take the next step. Our team, I have zero concerns about them being here. They're going

to make some sacrifices so we can make sure we execute at our best on game day.

Q. I want to talk about the five guys up front. I know we listen to Emmanuel saying we trust each other, the trust we have for each other. Tell me about that.

DAN LANNING: Yeah, one, I've been a lot of places, the O-line, the unit as a group, it's stronger here than anywhere I've been. They're truly like brothers in that room. They love and care for each other. I think it's a great indicator of our success this season and why that credit belongs to our O-line.

I know they're up for the Joe Moore Award. It's the third year in a row they've been up for that award. I certainly think they're very deserving of that. But ultimately whoever is up next, they go and they attack, and they care about the people around them. They're able to have fun. It's a group that has a lot of fun. But when they step on the field, they're very serious and certainly serious about protecting Dante.

Q. The rhythm of a playoff, to get that game a couple weeks ago, how do you feel about transitioning out of that and into this week?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, ultimately I think the best way to get good at football is playing football, and the best way to keep your rhythm is to continue to play. So us having that game in a lot of ways helps us keep our process the same, our schedule the same.

I think that can be a benefit coming into this game. Our guys have been able to maintain focus, and just really have to focus on one opponent that's really far down the road for a long period of time. Ultimately it's been a really good setup for our guys.



Q. Obviously Ohio State last year, but were there any indications from your side that that was going to happen?

DAN LANNING: I thought our guys practiced really hard. They played hard. Ultimately I thought those guys had a great plan for us and we didn't have a good plan. Also, they looked fresh and in sync, in rhythm, and I think part of that is probably a credit to them being able to play in a game against Tennessee.

But I did not go into that game thinking we were not going to have success. We had some success in the second half. I just think it took us a little while to warm up.

Q. (On the change in the playoff schedule.)

DAN LANNING: Yeah, I don't have a problem with the byes. I think teams that are higher seeds deserve byes. I think where the big problem is is trying to wait to play the games for a long period of time. Whether there's conference championship games or the end of the season ends at the end of the regular season, to me, games should be played every single week, every Saturday from there on out so, if there's a bye, there's no more than a two-week window waiting for a team to play.

Q. (Inaudible.)

DAN LANNING: It's different when you have one game. When you have one game and then there's an opportunity to have another game after that. To me, everybody has been in the playoffs for a long time before Division I football got involved in the playoffs.

Once we decided we wanted to do playoffs, we should have ultimately, in my opinion, followed the format of every other playoff model that

exists, whether it's the NFL, whether it's FCS football, whether it's Division II football, March Madness. Those games, there's not those long breaks in between. I think that's somewhere we messed up.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

DAN LANNING: Nothing really different than what we've done for our long travel games. We've played at Rutgers this year, Penn State, played at Northwestern. We've traveled probably more than any other team at our level in the country. So that's something we're used to.

But also in the spirit of the playoffs, I do think that there should be home playoff games until you get to the National Championship. There should be an advantage to being a higher-seeded team.

I'm sure we'll have a great turnout here at the Orange Bowl, but ultimately I bet we'd have an unbelievable turnout if this was at Texas Tech, or in the same frame, if this was Eugene, Oregon, or wherever these games could be played.

Q. Will you go back to Oregon if you win this game?

DAN LANNING: Yeah, we'll go back, and then we'll go to the Peach Bowl.

We're used to the travel. You get an eight-day window for the next game, so we'll travel back right after the game, hit the reset button, and then travel back again.

Will Stein, Offensive Coordinator



Q. Obviously you're hoping that you're going to be working on this next week, the portal is going to be open. Is that strange at all?

WILL STEIN: Yeah, I mean, strange? Obviously, like I said, when I'm here, it's all Oregon nonstop, try to keep your head in this tournament, with this game.

But that's what I signed up for, and I'd say it's first-world problems. That's what I signed up for, and to do it again with these guys on this stage, with these players, I'm glad I have the opportunity to do that before going to Kentucky.

Q. What about this offensive line -- obviously in one year they've managed to be a really interesting unit. How would you describe the way they've shown up?

WILL STEIN: They're really good. I think obviously they're great (indiscernible) and on the interior they're really active. It's an elite unit.

Q. How was your Christmas?

WILL STEIN: It was great. It really was great. We spent a good amount of time at home, just kind of relaxing with the kids, then when I had to field some phone calls, to work two jobs, but really just tried to be present in the moment with my family and give it my all and enjoy the time.

Q. How did your Christmas shopping go with your children and two jobs?

WILL STEIN: The night before, I said, what did we get Joey again? She kind of let me know beforehand. It's been fun.

Q. When you see the season that Dante has had, when you take into account the totality of his

process, coming here and then kind of -- I don't know if risk is the right word for what he went through last year, but just kind of the unconventional route, what do you take the most pride in in his development and where he's at?

WILL STEIN: How humble he is and how humble he's been. Never asked me one time last year about playing time or trying to get reps over Dillon. Just did his job. He's an absolute pro. Learns, develops, knew his time was coming.

And when it did, it's obviously been the right decision for him just to sit back -- not relax, because he pushed, he grew, but to just know that, hey, my time is coming. And whenever he's gotten that opportunity, he's made the most of it.

Q. What was your first interaction working out with him when he got here? Was he pushing Dillon at all?

WILL STEIN: Oh, yeah. He had some plays in spring that first year and I was like, oh, my God, this guy is special. He's unique. He's got rare ability in terms of throwing the football, anticipation, knowing angles, everything. It's very rare. You could tell right away this guy is going to be a first-rate player.

He didn't quite have that experience yet, but Dillon did, and Dillon was the right man for the job last year, went 13-0, but you definitely saw early on that Dante was unique.

Tosh Lupoi, Defensive Coordinator

Q. (On Behren Morton.)



TOSH LUPOLI: They operate at a high level and produced the way they have, and it starts with him. Doing a great job, and certainly look forward to the challenge here coming up in a couple days.

Q. Curious with him, he's been getting healthier the last few weeks. He's out of the boot. Might be healthier than he's been this season. Does that add a wrinkle to the game planning where it might be a slightly different look than was on tape a month ago or so?

TOSH LUPOLI: Yeah, it could. Obviously that's their choice. But within this offense there's plenty of quarterback run activity, and that's something that you see that has been a little less in these last few weeks. But he's certainly effective and can run the ball, and we know that. I think you certainly don't want to play the game of being unsound and accounting for him. He's already proven that at times and tucked the ball and landed some QB draws effectively.

I think we have to plan accordingly and know that he can be an effective weapon with both his arm and utilizing his legs, too.

Q. I know you're game planning for the Tech defense, but just from what you see when you do see it, what's your view of Tech's defense and what they've done this season?

TOSH LUPOLI: Yeah, I always like to look at the opponent's defense, too. Sometimes it can tell you quite a bit about the offense and some concepts they might be doing. But ultimately it's a team that attacks the ball really well.

What we've done all week when we're playing another good defense, I love to show comparisons of where we are from, for example, I think we have a slight lead ahead of them as

far as pass breakups. They lead as far as caused fumbles and interceptions. Love always showing the defense there as far as defense versus defensive opportunity for us. But they attack the ball well. We've watched that.

Then bring back the moments that we've attacked the ball well and then moments where we could have and missed some opportunities. So always love showing that when we're playing a good defense, to show the comparisons there.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

TOSH LUPOLI: Well, I certainly don't go by the paper, I go by the film, so it looks pretty darned explosive on film, as well. Really what they've accomplished is what they're supposed to. Supposedly their strength of schedule hasn't been what ours has. They've done exactly what you'd expect them, put a lot of teams in their place this year.

At the end of the day, they're explosive, multiple, operate with strong tempo, and got a lot of weapons out there that we're going to have to deal with.

So excited for the challenge, and we've prepared extremely hard for it, and love to find out how that preparation looks here in a couple days.

Q. What have you seen from their quarterback?

TOSH LUPOLI: Well, I would say what have we not seen. He's a guy that can tuck the ball and run, get out in four wide and stretch the field vertically. They've got a lethal screen that comes with it, as well.

Then you've got two backfield weapons that have done a great job, both in the pass game as



well as running the ball. They are who they are for a reason, explosive passes, explosive runs, and it's going to be a heck of a challenge. We're pumped for it.

Dante Moore, QB

Q. Walk us through your practice this week, how you're preparing.

DANTE MOORE: Yeah, we had practice this morning, of course. Felt great to come down, adjust to the weather. Another clean practice, another Thursday practice for us. The game plan is still getting put in, so like overall, practice went pretty good today. But overall, like I said, it's getting the reps down in Miami, getting adjusted to the weather. Everything went pretty good today.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

DANTE MOORE: Yeah, being able to play in warm weather, of course, is amazing. Back in Eugene right now, it's like 30 degrees. So being able to be in 70-degree weather is amazing. Of course we worked our tails off to be here. We're going to enjoy it for sure.

Q. (On his decision to declare for the NFL Draft.)

DANTE MOORE: No decision.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

DANTE MOORE: Yeah, I love our running backs to death. They made a lot of great plays, a lot of great blocks. Being able to play in this weather, all phases of the offense will be shown, first the run game, then the pass game. So overall we're excited. We have a great game plan. Coach Stein has done a great job dissecting Texas Tech's defense, so we're excited to get going.

Q. (Indiscernible.)

DANTE MOORE: Yeah, the three biggest things, first is just ball security, the biggest thing, punching the ball out. They have great linebackers, great D-linemen, great secondary. Another thing is run game, rushing yards, make sure we're moving the ball down the field when it comes to run game, and keep getting 1st downs. Moving the ball down the field. Those are the three biggest things for us.

Coach Stein has done a great job. Of course he has a lot on his plate. I feel like they're still giving us their 100 percent. Of course they all say that without this team, without this staff, that they wouldn't be in this position that they are now.

Of course it's congratulations to them getting a new job, but they know that the season, where we're at right now, they're still giving us 100 percent effort. Of course they have to worry about other things at their other schools, as well, but when it comes to us practicing and being in meetings, they're giving us their full attention, and we appreciate it.

Q. I know you and Dan (indiscernible). Is there a special story or something that stands out about your relationship with him?

DANTE MOORE: We have a lot of great memories for this team. I think the most important one that stands out is just his pregame speeches when we're in the locker room, when we're away or we're at home.

Of course the whole team is excited for the next speech because he's always having something memorized, always having a great story to tell to make sure our hair is on fire when we go take the field. I feel like the biggest thing he does is



preparing us to do a good job and play hard and play behind him.

Kenyon Sadiq, TE

Q. You grew up in Idaho, and you're in Miami. How is that?

KENYON SADIQ: Yeah, it's an awesome feeling. If you would have told me I'd be in this position back when I first went to Oregon, I wouldn't have believed you.

Q. With the Big Ten this year and all the times you have to fly east, do you think you have more of a system to try to figure out the setting?

KENYON SADIQ: Yeah, it almost feels regular, the amount of times, Penn State, Iowa, Rutgers, those long trips. You kind of get a routine. So coming out here doesn't mess with us. I know we're here for a couple more days, but it doesn't necessarily feel different.

Q. When you look across the field at Texas Tech, how do you see the team compared to some of the others you've seen this year?

KENYON SADIQ: Yeah, this is one of the best defenses in the country. That's no secret. They're good on all levels, their defense, their linebackers, D-line, secondary is really good, as well. It's about winning the game in all phases this week.

Q. When you look at Jacob Rodriguez on tape, is there anything in particular that jumps out about that guy?

KENYON SADIQ: Yeah, he's just a well-rounded player. He strings the ball out really well in particular, is really good at zone coverage, really good at reading tackles.

Q. What's it like having Dante Moore to throw to you?

KENYON SADIQ: You know, he's the best to do it. He makes it simple.

Q. You guys had that James Madison game a couple weeks ago. Texas Tech hasn't played for three, four weeks now. Is it an advantage or a disadvantage to have to play that game?

KENYON SADIQ: In my eyes, kind of being in both shoes, I definitely think it's an advantage for sure. You kind of get a look at things and you kind of get in a flow a little bit. When you don't play for however many weeks, I think it takes a toll.

Q. Are there things you're taking out of -- when you think about Texas Tech, things you can maybe exploit, without getting into game plans?

KENYON SADIQ: I would say come out starting fast. Last year, if we look at it, how fast Ohio State started versus (indiscernible) started, we were playing catch-up the whole game. So I think it's just not getting to that point again.

Iapani Laloulu, OL

Q. What gives you that pride in being from Hawai'i and playing for the University of Oregon?

IAPANI LALOULU: For me, I appreciate just getting back to my faith and my family, my roots, where I've come from is really big. We talk about pride in our culture, and I carry that around a lot, especially with my faith and the way that I carry myself. I just want to make sure I carry myself in the best way possible and to be a role model and an example for the kids in Hawai'i.



Q. What would you like to say to the folks in Hawai'i?

IAPANI LALOULU: I'd say I love all you guys and wish you guys were all here with me, but hopefully you all tune in on January 1st and watch me play in the Orange Bowl.

Q. What is it like for you playing for the University of Oregon?

IAPANI LALOULU: It's been an honor and it's been a blessing. Like I was saying earlier, there's a lot of kids, a lot of people that wish they could be in my seat but unfortunately weren't able to. I'm just blessed and thankful that the Lord has blessed me to be able to be here and to play for the University of Oregon. What a beautiful program. One of the best programs in this nation.

Q. You're going up against one of the best defensive lines, a really talented bunch. When you watch that film, what stands out to you and how you're going to be successful?

IAPANI LALOULU: I think one of the biggest things, as we were saying earlier, it's their effort. It don't matter how far away from the ball, chasing the ball, they're going to try to punch the ball out. So it's up to us as a front five, we want to make sure we're chasing the ball the best way we can. We want to make sure that we have possession all game and not give it up at all.

Q. What's unique about them that maybe you've seen from other teams?

IAPANI LALOULU: One thing that really stands out is their effort and their tenacity and their speed off the edge. Their two edges are really awesome, and their two interior, they do a great job, too. Texas Tech does a great job with their

guys making sure that they're ready and prepared to play well when it comes to their approach.

Q. Do you know who you're going to be going against primarily this game?

IAPANI LALOULU: I think it'll be their nose tackle, No. 2. I forgot his name, but I'm sure I'll probably be going against him primarily the whole game, but we'll be ready for it.

Q. What is the motivation that you have?

NOAH WHITTINGTON: Yeah, no more practicing. You get to go home.

Bryce Boettcher, ILB

Q. I know you guys had your first practice down here today. How are you guys feeling after the long flight and everything, getting ready to get after this thing?

BRYCE BOETTCHER: I feel good. The team feels good. Obviously we had a long flight yesterday, but had a good walk-through last night and a good practice this morning. I think we got our legs under us, and preparation has been great this last week and a half. Coming after that JMU game, energy has been up, and excited to see what happens this Thursday.

Q. A good Texas Tech team, right?

BRYCE BOETTCHER: Yeah, very good team.

Q. You played Texas Tech a couple years ago. What do you remember about that game, and what was your impression of Texas Tech back then?

Matayo Uiagalelei, OLB

MATAYO UIAGALELEI: It was pretty cool. They all welcomed us with oranges and hats and stuff. Very welcoming. It was pretty cool coming off the plane.

Q. What do you think of Texas Tech's two running backs?

MATAYO UIAGALELEI: I think they're both good. One of them, I think No. 8, right? I think so. Downhill runner. Then No. 20 will get in there, more like that shifty, passing game.

Both of their running backs are really good. I think very highly of them.

Q. How is their offense maybe similar or different to a Big Ten style?

MATAYO UIAGALELEI: Yeah, I would just say kind of the tempo. I think the only team that really had that kind of tempo that they have is probably Penn State. Just the tempo and a lot of screens, a lot of quick game, a lot of shots and stuff.

Q. What did they tell you?



DILLON THIENEMAN: They said second round.

Q. When you think about the factors, it's very hard to --

DILLON THIENEMAN: Yeah, often there's not always a safety taken the first round, and then there will be an outlier year where there's three, like a couple years ago. The bad part of that would be like potential injury. A safety, you can be the top safety, but you can end up in the same draft position.

Q. And if another safety who's a potential first round who's out there a couple years from now -- what would ultimately be the deciding factor, the injury component, the business side of it? Are there other factors in terms of who else might come back?

DILLON THIENEMAN: I feel confident about the coaches and the team. I know Tosh is leaving, but I really like Hampton. He's been a DC in the past. I'd be happy to come back if I choose to go that route.
